## 65 jobs coming to Duncan with DR2

A 4-1 vote from city council members led to the approval of committing sales tax dollars for the completion of a spec building which Duncan Recycling and Refining (DR2) will move into upon completion.

President for the Duncan Area Economic Development Foundation Lyle Roggow said as a result of DR2 locating to Duncan, the city will experience an increase of 65 jobs, roughly \$50,000 in payroll which is a little over \$3 million in new payroll to the community

"With benefits included, it will be more like \$4.4 million," Roggow said, noting DR2's total investment with machinery and other items would be in excess of \$8 million.

The project, which was approved by DAEDF's board of directors on June 17 before Roggow submitted the pro-

posal to City Manager Jim Frieda, asked for \$3,968,220 from sales tax dollars.

Roggow said six contractors requested plans on the project which originated in 2012. Three of those contractors attended the pre-bidders' meeting and finally, DAEDF received two bids.

The first was from Jan-L Construction for \$3.6 million and 240 days to completion. The other, which was awarded the bid, was from WW Builders for a grand total of \$3,420,879.54 with 180 days to completion on the project.

DR2, once operational, will use their new building for specialized equipment to split catalytic converters open with a decanner, remove a ceramic looking product, mill it, smelt it and separate platinum group metals from the ceramic product.

According to Roggow, DAEDF built a 28-foot tall shell building about a year ago, but didn't complete the project. Instead, the shell was designed to accommodate whatever potential business would soon make a home there. DR2, which will soon find it's home in Duncan, approved the situation and mailed in a letter of intent in October 2014.

Roggow said approximately \$342,087.69 is for contingencies and DAEDF will submit invoices to be paid and will return any funds not spend on this project.
